Week 13

Betty: Welcome to *LIFE Today*. Thank you so much for joining us. I'm Betty Robison and this is James.

James: Nicole Bromley is back with us. She wrote a book and you need to just look at the cover for a moment. A broken crayon and then the words, you can tell it was written by a child, the "s" is backwards and it is a child's writing. And the word says, Hush. Whoo! I almost began weeping when I imagine how that must have felt to a little girl that was being abused by her stepfather sexually; "Moving from silence to healing after childhood sexual abuse." There are some things that people do, like overeat. Maybe people are tempted and even become addicted because they've got a weakness towards some kind of substance abuse. People have affairs; they're wrong but you seem to be able to comprehend how it might happen. Maybe someone gets angry and foolishly hurts someone.

But to take a little child, use them to gratify your own appetites -- just how debased of human rationality and reason do you have to be to get to a point. How do adults become attracted to a little child?

Of course, Betty I ask the question, how can we seemingly without really flinching or batting an eye terminate the life of a little child in the womb where a little child wants to live? You say, "They don't have any feelings." That must be what the predator says about a child. We're trying to stop the abuse of little girls and those that have been trapped and get them out. And we do this because viewers like you said, "Let's help those little girls."

Well, Nicole was one of those little girls, only she wasn't exploited by someone who wanted to set up some prostitution or some illicit sex ring. She was abused by family. It was tough but it also gave her a burden and a compassion to want to help others. You're going to see and listen to Nicole where she is going as a mission outreach partner with *LIFE* to the ends of the earth, to the very pits of hell to try to rescue those who are suffering.

Nicole, we're so glad to have you.

Would you welcome Nicole Bromley back to *LIFE Today*?

You want to go and speak to people about this issue, in the churches, wherever they want you. If someone watches and says, "Nicole, how can we get you to come to our area and maybe tell girls how they can overcome?" Because I have actually asked with heads bowed, how many women or girls were abused? It's unbelievable. Sometimes 30% to 50% of the audience either lift their hand or wail a shriek of pain. So if they wanted you to come, how would they contact you?

Nicole: My web site: IAmOneVoice.org. They can contact me there. I've always felt called to be a voice for the voiceless. When I share my story, it is the same situation. Girls, even boys come forward out of the woodwork just to say "Me too." I think there is a lot of power in that. So my heart is to speak to churches, universities, to schools, to conferences, and put a voice to this voiceless crime.

James: And there is the web site. You can see it on the screen. I hope you will get Nicole to come because she is truly anointed and gifted of God to help. We're going to actually, in a moment go with you to the mission fields where you went to help us rescue those that had been trapped.

We're actually making your book available to those who are watching who will say, "I want to do something about it. I want to at least do my part to make a difference." But what would you want those who are watching now who have been in some way hurt, what do you want them to hear?

Nicole: Well, first I want them to know it wasn't their fault. I think there is a lot of guilt and shame that are carried by victims of sexual abuse and trafficking. It is not theirs to carry. That's the first thing, to break the silence, to speak and share your story, to share your secret. I think that's the first step to healing.

Then I also think that there is a lot of power in just not letting it be your story but understanding that it is everyone's story. So many of us are carrying hurts, traumas, abuse, and we need to rise against it. That's why I don't want to just stop with writing books and sharing my story, I want to travel the world and I want to say no to sex trafficking.

James: Nicole, when you talk about -- even in your subheading, "breaking the silence," I can imagine that girls that have been taken advantage of, would be very frightened to talk about it. Who do you recommend a child to... who does a child go to without the

fear of the threats or reprisal that can come -- the horror that can come by them going? What do they do? What do you suggest?

Nicole: I tell kids and adults who have been never broken their silence, who do you trust? Who do you feel comfortable with? Who do you think would believe you? And you tell -- and you tell until you are believed. So many times I speak and people will say, "I did break the silence. I told my mom but unlike your mom, they didn't believe me. They told me to hush." Or "They told me that I just needed to be quiet and protect our family name." -- So many kinds of things. So I say, "You tell until someone believes you." And it takes a lot of courage to tell.

James: Did it take a while before you were believed? Did it take an extended period of time and were you fearful of being hurt because you did tell?

Nicole: I was sexually abused for nearly a decade by my stepfather. I was scared to death of telling. For one no one talked about abuse when I grew up. No one told me that this was wrong. There was no education there about this kind of thing. I believed my stepdad. He was very well known in our community, respected. I loved him and trusted him. I didn't have a reason not to. So for many years I believed that what he was doing was teaching me, like he said, or this is what girls go through when they grow up. And if I ever told I would never see my mom again. That no one would believe me because I was just a little girl.

So for many reasons I was silent, and I kept silent for that long. But I'm so glad that I finally told when I was 14 years old and my mom did believe me.

Betty: Because of the abuse that you went through, how did this affect you in other relationships? And did it give you appetites for things that weren't necessarily good for you?

Nicole: Sure. I think that any child that has been violated in such a way will have those types of things growing up. You look at yourself as a sexual object, that that's where love and affection come from, that that's your value. So I do, looking back, and realizing that... healing is a lifelong journey. This isn't something where I can stand here and though I'm free of the shame and the pain and I believe God has delivered me to not only be free of that but to be a voice to it, there is still hang-ups that come up along the way. I still struggle. I still feel like a mess. But I feel like God meets me in that mess and he can still use me.

James: You found healing when you began to offer healing and help to someone else. Am I right about that? Because I have coming out of difficult circumstances, I find great fulfillment in reaching out to lift someone else out of the pit of despair. You found that same peace.

Nicole: I feel like my life calling is right there in Second Corinthians 1:3 and 4. It talks about how God comforts us in our trouble so we can comfort others in their trouble -- that can be anything. God comforts every single one of us in some way in our life and he calls us not to just accept it but to reach out and offer it to others. That's why I want to be a missionary; I want to be a mouthpiece to the world of the comfort that God gives me, not just back then, not just today, but in the future because this healing thing is forever and I want to continue to receive, also to give.

James: I want us to go and just watch you as you are recapping your recent mission trip. Let's join Nicole in another country where it is very difficult.

On the mission field:

>> So this is my first time in Southeast Asia and my very first opportunity to come face to face with the victims of sex trafficking here. The girls that I met in the brothel really express so much of feeling trapped, feeling hopeless, feeling like there was no way out for them. I can just remember myself as a young girl being sexually abused by my stepdad over and over again, as a child, feeling like there was no way out. There was -- I had no voice. I had a secret to keep and there was nothing I could do about it.

These girls are living through the same thing day after day, night after night. And I can just imagine how hopeless that felt. I even asked one of them what help looked like. What would it look like to be helped out of the situation? And she couldn't even - she couldn't even come up with an answer because to her, there was no help, there was no option.

That broke my heart because that's what we're here for. That what we as Christians are here to do. We're here to help people. Jesus came to rescue these girls. And here she is telling me that she doesn't feel like she can be rescued; that this is what her purpose is in life. I feel like when I walked into those brothel rooms that my life changed.

I've always asked God ever since I got rescued from my situation that if He could break my heart for what breaks His heart, that that was my ministry. Here I was sitting

in a brothel room with these girls who have not been rescued. And God was answering my prayer, he was breaking my heart for what breaks his.

My only answer is that I want to bring hope to these girls -- I want to bring rescue to these girls. They shouldn't be living through this. We can be the answer. We really can, I believe that. But we've got to become an army against this. The body of Christ could totally change the culture, could totally change the world when it comes to modern day slavery. But we have to be willing to let our hearts be broken for these girls.

In the studio:

James: Nicole, you were in a very challenged country; you were in Cambodia. We've got *LIFE* Centers in Thailand, which is the sex capital of the world and built the largest *LIFE* Center there to rescue girls. And we've supported -- we've supported for years Mark Rutland, who has been the president of Oral Roberts University for several years, and has recently moved on in doing mission work. We've been working with him for a long time rescuing people in that area, but all over the world, the Ukraine, many places.

The thing I think our viewers want to know, do these missionaries and relief workers that we support, "we" meaning the viewers, *LIFE Outreach*, all of us together, are they effective in what they do and does it really, really work? Do we succeed in getting children before the predator gets them, heading them off from the lies that take them, and then actually getting them out when they've been trapped for an extended period of time? Does it work?

Nicole: I can tell you, I network all over the country, all over the world with organizations who are doing the job of anti-trafficking, and I have never been so moved, so amazed, so inspired by what *LIFE Outreach* does. And I'm telling you that... I've been sharing that ever since I returned home because you guys are the real deal. You are a family first, but secondly, you are God's people who are making matches all over the world. The way you partner is amazing.

And the missionaries that are there, they go out. They go to the villages and they say, "Don't sell your kids to these --." They are beating them there -- they are beating the traffickers to the village. Because the traffickers will come and they will tell this great story of how they are going to take their daughters and give them a better life than they could ever give them, these parents. And the parents think they are godsend --

these men who come and put their daughters on a bus and give them a job and education and teach them English, and they're going to send all this money home and see their daughters in two years.

I saw what happens to those girls. It is not a godsend. It is straight evil. It is the pit of hell these girls are going through. And what *LIFE Outreach* is doing is beating the traffickers to those parents and saying, "Don't do it." And they're not only doing that but they're rescuing these girls. They're rescuing them out of slavery.

James: We're speaking the truth in love. And we're demonstrating it by giving them a chance, by giving them an alternative because if you think about it, in a terribly impoverished area, if some smooth talker may have some money and says, "We're going to take your daughter who needs to learn a trade and a job, who will really be able to succeed and be able to help the family, we're going to take them off and we're going to give them a good education and a good job" and they believe them, and away they go. In a little while you're going to hear from a mother as she was actually talking about what happened.

And it is so typical, isn't it, of what is happening all over... let's say third-world countries and frankly, is even happening here where people are recruiting girls by getting teenage boys to go talk them into doing something and then they get them hooked on drugs and they use them, and many times they never get back home.

And then they're bringing people across our borders and trafficking girls, telling them they're going to take them to another country, America, where they're going to get ahead.

The sexual predation, number one, we've got a real problem with men who are out of control. They don't have normal desires, normal attraction, they've been taken beyond. They've been taken into a pit of defeat themselves.

And then you've got the exploiter for money who will take these girls and use them for selfish gain, to use them up and destroy them -- oftentimes kill them. Well, love is their hope and it really does work -- the same way you've been healed in your heart, and only God's love and God's grace and others that you were able to talk to enabled you to make it. Right?

Nicole: That's right! I think trafficking in America is about lovelessness and the family, the fatherlessness. Girls here in America are looking for that; they don't have

daddies. They don't have anyone to tell them what love looks like. So they go out and a trafficker comes along, a pimp and says, "You're my girl! I'm your daddy." That's all they want! So I would have been vulnerable to that.

James: You felt that when you came here because you felt like we cared about you; didn't you? You felt family love. You felt it in the way of father love; didn't you? And then you want to take that out because you know people need that. That's what everybody is looking for. It's really what we're able to do.

But the thing I think people need to understand, you can see the missionary and you can see the work but without the viewer enabling them to build, to take care of the girls, there wouldn't be any mission outreach. The bottom line in taking the gospel is the one who sends it, not just the one who preaches it, not just the one who goes, but the one who sends. That's what Paul talked about when he was writing to the Romans.

The bottom line in reaching people is the sender, even beyond the preacher or the missionary. So to our viewers all over the world because they are watching us virtually worldwide and every province in Canada, every state in the United States, are our viewers assured that when we say it works, it works?

Nicole: I can testify to that. I will say too, I believe that this is a very strategic work. There is only specific people who can do this work of rescuing girls in brothels. It is very dangerous and there is only a few who are called and qualified. But God needs all of us to gather together and to send them. We have to fund them. We have to enable their work to even happen. Without your viewers, this stuff would never happen; girls would not be rescued and that message would not be taken to these villages.

Betty: They need a place for these girls to come when they get them out of those situations.

Nicole: A Home! They need a safe home to go to.

Betty: A place for them to feel safe and secure in that family environment.

James: I think what we've learned is... and this is where I believe God gifts people to lead in the church, the family of God, the family of faith, we have a gift of discernment as believers. We believe as ministry leaders, which we are, we lead a ministry; we try to lead people to Christ. We try to lead people to walk with Christ, in the Spirit of God, in the spirit of love and compassion. We believe that you discern what's effective and you discern truth, and then you bear witness of it and you support it. That's where

all the body parts fit together, supplying each need; lower arm, upper arm, the hand, submitting to the head, which is Christ, the will of God -- that's what we're seeking to do. You make it possible. You're the ones who put the oil in the lantern, the light that's burning. Now I want you to listen very, very closely to a woman who tells you firsthand -- firsthand experience with her own daughters what you just heard.

On the mission field:

Announcer: Daughters, what a precious gift! You want the very best for them. Yem, mother of two thought she found it.

Announcer: It was the promise of a life she couldn't provide. What it meant was letting them go. What it became was something altogether different.

Her oldest managed to make it back home but almost unrecognizable from the abuse, and in a condition that quickly took her life.

Yem's youngest daughter has neither been found nor heard from again.

>> As you can see it's completely ruined her whole life; for her family, she has nothing. She has no children here. She had two beautiful daughters and all she has is the pictures to look at. We have to help her. No mom should ever have to face this. This mom is living it. We have to help her.

In the studio:

James: Somebody's precious girls.

Betty: James, as I was watching that, I think, evil looks for vulnerability; it looks for the helpless to destroy -- seeks to destroy. And this precious mother thought she was doing what was best for her daughters. She wanted them to have a better life. What parent wouldn't? We always want the best for our children. But she was deceived. Evil came and took her children, and now she weeps; her heart is broken. I think that is just one example of what's happening to these children. They need hope. They need someone to care for them. They need a place to go to lay their heads and rest.

James: You know one of the girls that you saw, obviously, was blinded in one eye. A lot of the little children that we rescue in places like Mumbai and other places of poverty, they'll get these little children and they will cut their hand off or they'll blind them so they become better beggars. I don't know how she was blinded but she was obviously abused.

But then the other little girl, that other daughter, but Betty, I couldn't help but think wouldn't it be wonderful if we could find her daughter, and at least show her she is going to be okay? And then you need to know that we get those girls like that that we find and we're able to give them a home.

And when I say "we," please understand we. Betty and I support every outreach of *LIFE* because we believe in it. And many of the outreaches we believe in we believe in because of people like you. You showed us something that needed to be done. And you said, "James, would you help?"

I said, "Well, we'll help if we can get others to join us." And you do! And you really wanted to do this. You wanted to rescue these girls. And amazingly, it cost only \$128 to rescue a child; that's to get them, a woman or a child out, and then take care of them. That actually includes being able to get secure facilities, even sometimes it means building it and when you build it, then you ask viewers to help us do it.

Now we've been able to build some incredible *LIFE* Centers. We're going to ask you to help restore one that has been damaged by fire and actually enlarge it because it's so effective. But you see what we're doing is we're rescuing those girls that are going to have happen what just happened there. Somebody told that mother, "We're going to give your girls a future" and they destroyed their future and their lives -- can't even find one of them.
