Week 24: Spring Mission Feeding, last week

James and Randy Robison

Josh McDowell

James: That's pretty good! That's pretty amazing. James Robison here welcoming you to *LIFE Today*. Our son Randy is here. Betty was unable to be here tonight. She is not ill. She just had another assignment that was important for her. We did have another great grandbaby; that wasn't the assignment though, particularly there but thank you for always caring. It really means a lot.

The people were really excited. They're clapping. I wanted to say maybe it is because of our guest, Josh McDowell. He wrote *Evidence that Demands a Verdict*. Man, it was back when he and I were both kids. We're still pretty young but back when we were kids these things were happening.

Josh: The Dead Sea was only sick.

James: You're right.

[Laughter]

That's one reason they're clapping. I've got to tell you the real reason they're clapping is they had seen his shoes. So welcome Josh McDowell. Here's Josh. Just welcome Josh.

But let's get a close-up of his shoes. I want you to see the man's shoes. Can we show you the shoes? Is it possible? There they are. How do you like those shoes? All right, Josh, where did you get the shoes?

Josh: They were a gift from the Columbian soccer team; football team in South America.

James: So is something going on down there beside drugs?

Josh: Well, I had a chance to speak to the team. It didn't work because they lost.

[Laughter]

James: Did they want to take them back?

Josh: It was better than an honorarium.

James: They're beautiful. They really are. By the way, you look sharp.

Here is a book that I want you to kind of look at the title, *Set Free to Choose Right*. I think that's more than an implication or an inference, I think it is an absolute fact. I think people are unable to choose right because they are not free. They don't even think free. It's like there is a grip and it is almost like they're being held captive in their thoughts. Rather than taking thoughts captive, thoughts are taking them captive so there is a freedom there. But you're talking about choosing right and you talk about equipping kids to make the right moral decisions.

I have an idea that you touch on very important, very serious topics. I'd just like you to cut to the chase because my prayer is that every parent and every concerned person, probably every pastor, because I know what you're talking about and I know the things you address, they need to be addressed effectively and wisely. And I think most parents, and even church leaders, they don't know how to address them. So just take off and address some of the things that you really want us to be able to set free to make good choices.

Josh: Well, what you're referring to is a story line I have going through the book of a family with children who become addicted to pornography. Through the book I use them as a story line of how to help even a child like that to make right, moral choices.

James: So there are several children involved in that?

Josh: Yes. But pornography, I wish you never even had to mention that it is the greatest threat, the greatest devastation to the cause of Christ in the history of the church. In all...

James: Let me say upfront, I believe that. I totally believe that.

Josh: You and Chuck Swindoll set the pace on that. Chuck said it's the greatest cancer in the history of the church.

About seven years ago I realized as an apologist setting forth truth to believe that I was seeing something in youth culture, in kids' conversations I couldn't put together. Usually I can pinpoint a problem and pinpoint the answer. It took me a whole year. When I called home to Dottie I said, "Honey, I found out what it is."

She said, "What?"

I said, "It is pervasive internet pornography."

Now what I saw here, when a person starts watching pornography, and after just minutes or so they become compulsive usually, is that their authority in the scriptures, the Bible, in Christ, and their pastor and their church and their parents starts to erode and that's what I was catching in their attitudes and all. I traced it back to pornography.

The problem is there is such an ignorance -- ignorance in the body of Christ among parents. I can almost never ever ever meet any Christian leader, parent, or anything that's even 1/1,000th informed of pornography. The majority of...

James: They've never been exposed to any of it or what? Or it's a different level?

Josh: They think they're the only one. They didn't get it and it's not a problem.

James: But today it is a massive problem.

Josh: I'll tell you the problem. You get up in the church, any evangelical church, look out over the church. I paid a quarter of a million dollars to be able to say this, look out over the church and 70% of all the young men between 18-34 actively seek out pornography on the internet, 56% of the women.

James: Now repeat those stats again.

Josh: From 18-34 years old in any evangelical church, 70 some percent, comes up to about 77-78% of all the men, 56% of the women actively seek out pornography on the internet. It didn't just slip by on that.

James: Can I ask you this question?

Josh: I'll put it this way. Let me point out, even Dr. Ted Roberts say that 55-58% of all evangelical, fundamental, born again Christian pastors are addicted to pornography.

James: Boy, this leads to heavy stuff. Here's the question I simply want to ask you. God says flee sexual immorality, fornication; every sin but that is not against the body -- that is against the body. When we move in that area, is there a damage inflicted upon our basic being?

Josh: Yes! Within one half second. Now it takes drugs about six minutes, alcohol about 13 minutes to reach the brain; with pornography -- a half second. Within a half second starts a process that within six minutes your brain is physically, biologically changed. Different than

drugs... It's far harder to beat pornography than heroin, cocaine, alcohol because of what it does to the brain.

I'll say to any pastor, I don't care how much you know the Word of God, I don't care how many solutions you know for people's problems, if you do not understand the human brain, then please don't tell me you have a biblical answer for pornography because you don't. Before it's even a sin problem, it is a biological brain problem and that's what people don't realize.

But look at this, 38% of ministers watching pornography lose their job or their profession or their business; 60 some percent end in divorce. That's how powerful it is.

James: So is it ripping people apart because something has held them with such a grip?

Josh: Well, it's a deep shame first of all. A very deep -- now shame is...

James: By the way, do we add to that shame unknowingly in the church?

Josh: Oh, yes!

James: Do we make people who are trapped by something that might be evil believe they are evil? Yeah, it is, "You are bad. You didn't just do bad -- you're bad."

Josh: Shame is how we look at ourselves. Guilt is because of our actions. We become guilty. It is shame.

The problem is when you start watching pornography, say if you're a believer and over half do, of believers, evangelicals, they start watching it, they will start developing a shame. But it is so powerful they can't walk away from it.

James: And they don't talk about it; do they? They don't bring it up; do they?

Josh: No. And the shame starts to affect their intimacy in relationship with others, you start to withdraw. That's one of the biggest problems. In the church, I tell pastors, you cannot counsel -- I'll put it this way, overwhelming majority of pastors, boy this is dangerous to say this on your show -- the overwhelming majority of pastors and Christian leaders that counsel people on pornography are normally doing more damage than good.

James: How do they do the damage? Please help them.

Josh: Because they take the typical, and for many it is a good biblical [mumbles]. You just

need to make the decision, you're not going to watch anymore -- the will. Second, read God's word.

Third, trust Jesus and he'll take care of it. No, you can lead to suicide. Why? The key to porn is realizing porn is not the problem. Porn is a symptom of a deeper root problem, loneliness, anguish, fear, boredom. There are trigger points up to 19-20 trigger points that has been developed in your life through the years through being wounded.

Every person I've ever met in life has been wounded. You've been wounded, Randy. You've been wounded. I've been wounded. Everyone here has been wounded and when you deal with just the surface level pornography stopping they will say, "See, he got freedom, he's got victory over it." Two months later they'll be deeper into pornography than they ever dreamed. Why? Because they didn't deal with the deeper root problem. What happens is when you deal with the surface problem and not the root problem and then the person says, "Oh I'm free. The pastor said I'm free" and then boom, it will come back. It will come back. Then you lose hope.

But here's the key. From six to thirteen years of age I was homosexually raped every week for seven years, sometimes two or three -- [Emotionally overwhelmed] Whoo! Two or three times a week I was forced for seven years every single day to look at homosexual pornography. It's right up here. After I came to Jesus, second year in university, the greatest truth I ever learned is when I realized I need *more* than Jesus. If I stick with Jesus I'm going to fail.

I think one of the greatest sins preached today and I hear it all the time, it's in Christian music, "All you need is Jesus" -- that's evil -- that is not biblical!

James: You almost sound like you're getting heretical yourself.

Josh: Yeah! Anybody that questions that, they're the heretical one. Why? Just read your Bible for heaven's sake! I say to people, don't just read it study it.

When it comes to my salvation, James, all I need is Jesus. I don't need Jesus plus works, Jesus plus baptism, Jesus plus communion, whatever. But James, almost everything after my salvation I need more than Jesus. I need the church. I need the body of Christ. About 50 times in the New Testament, mark it out, "one another," that's not you and Jesus -- that's you and a brother or a sister in Christ. Love one another. Comfort one another. Encourage one another. Galatians: Bear one another's burdens. James five: Confess your sins to one another. When we confess our sins to God, what does the Bible promise? Forgiveness. We confess our sins one to another, what does God provide? Healing! And every time a pastor says, "All you need is Jesus," they're cutting people off from one of the greatest sources of healing -- the body of Christ. I wouldn't be here without Dick Day, Jim Simpson.

James: I wouldn't either. That's what I'm wanting to shout!

Josh: I wouldn't be here without the body of Christ!

James: Dung! Dung without family that loved like Jesus, that didn't shame me, that lifted me up into the presence of His grace -- that's what we need.

Josh: One of the first things towards healing we realize you can't go it alone. I don't care if you're a triple personality A, don't go it alone. You won't make it.

James: Boy, that's so powerful! God, please help people to hear this.

Josh: Then second, you've got to incorporate in the person the exciting biblical-based concept of sexuality because -- especially with a child.

James: It is a beautiful gift!

Josh: See what most children, most Christian kids, their parents haven't talked to them about sex. I think you have to start at five and build into them a certain concept of biblical sexuality. Why? Because the first time they see porn -- and your child, your grandchildren are going to see porn. These people who say, "Oh, I can protect my child." No, you can't. I don't care if you homeschool them, you pray over them, you have family to watch. You cannot protect your child. They will see pornography. And the key is have you prepared them for the first time they see it? Because it is not *if* they are going to see it it is *when*. And when they see it that first time there needs to be two things incorporated: One, that mother and dad has created the most incredible, loving, intimate, secure home where that child feels free to talk to mommy and daddy about any -- I mean *anything* without shame, without judgment -- but James, without starting to quote the Bible. Some Christians can't open their mouth without saying, "Well, don't you know God says this? The Bible says..." That's one of the fastest ways to lose your child.

James: Doesn't it add more shame to them for some reason?

Josh: That's right! You listen to them and then you bring in the truth of God's word.

So the first thing you need to do is build that relationship. Second, by I would say five, at the maximum eight because the average age for a child seeing it is eight years old worldwide, if by the first time your child sees pornography you've not built into them a certain concept of God's beautiful reason for sexuality then when they see that porn the first time they cannot detect a counterfeit from the original. And the majority of Christian young people to this day believe porn is God's approach to sex. And it comes back to mom and dad. And then God's grace -- God's

grace.

James: You've written a book not only dealing with this, but in-depth, many other challenges. There's not a way in the world -- name two or three of them. We don't have time to go into them. But name a couple other areas other than this that you try to deal with.

Josh: Well, how do you help your child to make consistent right choices? For example, among young people, Christian young people, 56 or 57 percent will say not recycling is immoral. Only 32 percent will say watching pornography is immoral.

How do you teach your children right from wrong? For example, I'll be in any meeting, pastors' meetings, leaders', parents', whatever, and I'll say, "Do you believe lying is wrong?"

Everyone says, "Yes."

I'll say, "Why?"

90% will always say, "Because the Bible says so."

And I go, oh, my gosh! No wonder we're losing our kids. That is wrong. Absolutely nothing is morally right or wrong because the Bible says "thou shall not" and yet almost every Christian parent teaches that and it is preached from the pulpit. That is wrong. It is unbiblical. The Bible is not legalistic but the way it is so often taught it becomes legalistic the way we teach it.

And this book here is saying, "I want to bring you back to the person, character and nature of God." One of the principles there is four steps we use with our kids. One, consider the choice. Okay, I can do this or do that. This could be --. Second, compare it to God. Consider the choice, compare it to God. Third, and this is a tough one -- commit to God's way. And then third, count on his blessing to protect and provide. And in the book I walk parents through how they can teach this to their children and how you can literally show your children that literally following God's character is your way of right from wrong, you enjoy life more, it is better for you, everything because God is able to protect you and provide for you.

We need to take and show our kids that when it says "thou shall not" and this is what I help parents in there, illustration after illustration, how to show what appears to be negative here is actually positive. I mean you take where it says in First Corinthians 6:18, Flee sexual immorality. Almost every Christian [mumbles] everything says, "That's so negative. God doesn't want you to enjoy yourself."

No! He says for it is the one sin you commit against your body. In 1960, one out of 63 teenagers

were infected with a sexually transmitted disease. In 1970, one out of 57. 1940, about one out of 32; 30 years ago, it was about one out of 20 some. You know what it is today? One out of two. 50 percent.

And God says, "I love you. I don't want to take the fun out of life. I want to protect you from the one sin that literally effects your body." Wow!

I document all of this in there and show parents chapter after -- how to do this in this area and that area with pornography and everything. See, God is truth. There's a principle out of that: Honesty. There's a precept out of that: Thou shall not lie. Behind every precept is a principle. Behind every principle is the person, character, and nature of God.

James: You need to be here about a week. Let me say to all of you who are watching, now please listen to me! I beg you to get the book. If you don't know that you have a need for it you know people that have a desperate need for it. If you have grandchildren, now we're having great grandchildren, I want to tell you something. I happen to know things were said to our grandchildren that were revolutionary in a positive way -- in a positive way and they're as natural and normal as anybody's ever been made in the image of God with the very desires and appetites God puts in. I'm telling you, I'm watching miracles.

You and I wouldn't be here if it weren't for the miracle of grace because we would have been destroyed. Our lives were set up for total destruction. We got a mighty God that's got two guys here that are excited about the greatness of God's grace. Again, would you say thanks to God and thanks to Josh for being so honest? Get the book in the bookstores. Get it. Share it. Let God direct you as you offer grace and help. Josh, come back soon.

Let me say this to you. Now don't leave me right here. This is the last week in this emphasis, why I'm coming to you. Listen to what I'm saying to you. We're coming to you asking you right now to just reach out in love and notice the unnoticed, the too often overlooked. God does not overlook them but he sees them through eyes that have hands and hearts and minds to express his heart, his mind, and extend his hands. That's what we're going to get to do right now. And I'm going to tell you something with all my heart, I believe you're going to want to do it. Watch.

On the mission field

Isak: It really just breaks my heart how the children in this village know what it means to have an empty bowl because empty bowls mean empty stomachs and empty stomachs mean going to be a night after night suffering from the pain of hunger, starvation, malnutrition and ultimately death.

The graves are full -- full of children; precious little lives, children who have a name, children who mean so much to their family, children whose lives are stolen simply because they didn't have enough food.

In the studio

James: I can't tell you how much I want us to pick those little children up. And maybe you didn't notice, he had just a kind of ordinary bowl but right beside him there was a big tub full of bowls like this. You know where they came from? Somebody like you kept watching these little children with their old tin cans, rusty cans, plastic bags, whatever they could bring to get something to eat, and the soup has to be hot because we're dealing with water that's not always the purest and it has to be boiled. It would burn their little fingers. Sometimes people watched them drop their little bowls or their little can and they would fall to the ground and start eating it right off the dirt.

Our viewers said, "Let's give them heat-resistant bowls. There was a whole tub of those. Love paid for that. But love did something even more important than that, it filled the bowls with a manifestation of love. It filled them with food that was nourishing, literally established with a scientific biological overview of the very nutritional needs in that particular area, what's lacking. That's what love does.
