Christmas Shoes and Smiles Special

Randy: Welcome to *LIFE Today*. This is a fun one! I'm glad you're with us. I hope you'll stick with us because I think you're going to see that you can do something very special. Sheila, have you started any Christmas shopping yet?

Sheila: Oh, gosh! No. I haven't actually. I'm hopeless. Every year I think next year I'm going to start like in January because everything is on sale then. I meant to do it but then I think, oh, gosh. No. The shops are too busy because the sales are on.

Randy: I can't imagine you're worse than me. I'm one of those guys that like a week early is early.

Sheila: Oh, gosh. No! I'm better than that!

Randy: Yeah, that's why my wife -- if you get a Christmas gift, it's probably something my wife picked out.

Sheila: Actually, let me just say something and I'll tell you about it later but I already have my husband's Christmas gift.

Randy: Wow!

Sheila: And he already has mine and we both know what it is but I'll tell you about it a little bit later.

Randy: I love it! You're going to make us wait. Well, we're a little early this year. We're talking about Christmas. There is something you can do. I hope you will choose to be involved in this because you can really make this a special Christmas for some children. We're going to show you some of that.

I want to read a scripture. Can I just tap into my YouVersion app here and read something? Because this jumped out at me a few weeks ago and I think it ties in nicely with the spirit of Christmas and with what LIFE is doing around the world.

Paul is writing to the Ephesians and he says: For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God.

Christmas is the time where we celebrate that gift. Jesus' birth started all that. It was the ultimate gift that God gave to us. So when we talk about the gift we see it as... "Not as a result of our works" -- thank you, Lord! -- "so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them."

That is such a beautiful verse to me, Sheila because a lot of times we think, we've got to do these things. Paul is saying look, it is not what we do. The works is not what gives us salvation or gives us righteousness or holiness or any of that. It is the gift of God through his Son that enables us to turn around and do the works that he has designed us for.

Sheila: I love that. It is kind of like a godly paradox. It is like you know what? You don't have to do anything. Christ did it. On the cross he said, "It is finished." Once you get that, then I think the natural, the most natural thing is you want to turn around and share that love with other people; to put feet to what Christ has done in your life.

Randy: And nice phrasing because it says "so that we may walk in them." You know walking is kind of what we're talking about today.

Sheila: Absolutely! What I love about what we're going to show you here is I think this year, wouldn't it be cool if we kind of revolutionized Christmas? If we take it back from the malls and the stores and decide you know what? We're going to start with the very littlest, the youngest among us, and we're going to remember what Christmas is actually all about.

There are some people I want to show you that have done that in just the most remarkable way. This church, this group of people have really given a gift to their kids in understanding that Christmas is not just all about what you get, it actually can be something that you give.

Randy: It is. I'm going to tell you a little back story here because these shoes mean something. Several years ago my parents were in Central America and they decided to do something fun for Christmas and give out just some simple shoes, and the impact was beyond what we even understood. So we have asked other people to join us and we've seen some amazing results. Watch what one church did as they decided to join us in our Christmas shoes.

Marla: I'm Marla Moreland and my husband, Bob and I, we live in Halfway, Missouri and we run a small Bible study. We have a great youth program and they love to get involved in missions. If we don't teach our children to follow Christ the world will teach them not to. So my goal is to teach them very, very young that they need to be out there serving others.

Our kids are very, very blessed here and I want them to have some sense of knowing that it's not like that everywhere and that they have to do their part; that everyone should do their part. And for my kids to be able to understand that they can make an impact on the other side of the world is just amazing.

So when I seen the shoe project on the television show it was a perfect fit. The kids loved it. It was something they could relate to.

>> Because we wanted to learn about God and Jesus, and give the other kids some shoes; they didn't have no shoes.

Marla: Taking off their shoes was like prying them off their feet, almost because they love their shoes.

>> We walked around the track to feel how the other kids felt whenever they didn't have any shoes.

>> I went barefoot like, I think half a lap, and then I had to put my shoes on because it hurt my feet really bad.

>> It felt like needles stabbing into my feet.

>> When I actually do that it really hurts. I just looked for the spots that there's like not that much rocks.

>> Walking around the track without shoes, it didn't feel very good at all. It hurt.

>> I thought my feet were just going to blow up. My feet hurt but I bet their feet hurt ten times worse.

>> When I saw the video, it made me feel really sick because we have shoes and they don't.

>> When I saw the kids, I really felt bad for them.

>> It would hurt their feet if they walk too much on rocks.

>> It's sad that they have to walk on that stuff. Their sores are so big. Like I don't know how they can stand -- I couldn't stand that if I was them.

>> They don't have anything really and their feet are all tore up and it can get infected and they can die.

>> You can help people by just doing little things. Just helping little kids out across the world is cool.

>> The shoes, it was like one of the biggest presents that they've ever gotten.

>> Happy that they're going to get shoes.

>> I just think it is really good what we're doing for them.

>> When you gave the shoes to those kids, I think it made them really happy.

>> I would think that they would be so happy they would almost burst into tears because I don't think they would have ever had any other shoes.

In the studio

Sheila: Gosh! If every Bible study in America adopted that and said, "Hey, let do that." That's stunningly beautiful!

Randy: Oh, my goodness! And you've been overseas, I've been in several places where we've handed out the shoes and you know, these kids just light up because it's special to them but it's also a big deal to them.

Sheila: The thing I love about this, Randy is the way they taught our kids here that Christmas is not just about you receiving stuff. Honestly, usually by Christmas Eve, kids have -- Christmas day they've forgotten half the stuff but that will stay with those children. They know something that we did made a huge difference in the life of another child.

Randy: Literally, they put them on every day and they're reminded, hopefully of the love of Christ because everything we do we do in the name of Jesus Christ because we're not just a

charitable organization, we are a Christian organization. So it's a wonderful blessing to just be able to be a part of this kind of thing. What stood out to you the most when you were overseas handing out -- did you handout several shoes or did you..?

Sheila: It was funny because we were basically over doing mission feeding but at the end of the day there was this one little boy who would not smile at me at all. I discovered we had a pair of the shoes in the van so I thought, dude, you're getting the shoes. It was just the sweetest thing to be able to -- because his little feet, he had never worn shoes. I looked at some of the ground they were walking over. I mean it is hard, it is rough.

Also, if you get a cut in your foot here, immediately, your family takes you off and you get a tetanus shot. You get a cut in your foot there, you end up with ringworm, you can end up with protein deficiency, you can end up with brain disease, all sorts of things. But when you put shoes on the feet of these little ones, sometimes you have literally saved their life.

Randy: Yeah. That's, I think, one of the things that struck me the first time I was out, the infection, it is really a terrible list of maladies; the hookworm is one of the biggest culprits. But yeah, you're right. We're not just giving them a nice pair of shoes, even though they are a nice pair of shoes; they're waterproof, which is very helpful. They are malleable so they fit; they're comfortable. But you're right, they save lives. Shoes actually save lives. So it's a wonderful thing to be able to be involved in something that makes a kid smile but also protects them long term.

Sheila: And they're so reasonable! Do you know for \$36 -- you cannot buy shoes, sneakers for your kids with that. Do you know you can buy shoes for ten children \$36? If you had \$72 you could buy them for 20 children.

We can all do something. That's what that last piece showed us. So please call! Please go online and while you're doing that, we want to show you something else that I think will really move you. Watch this.

On the mission field:

Clint: We're approaching the time of the year when Life Outreach does its Christmas Shoes and Smiles campaign. The smiles are for corrective surgery. But what we're doing today is we're getting these young boys and young girls shoes for the very first time. You can actually see the importance of what we are doing because look at this little girl, Veronica. She's got these sores on her feet already. She's obviously never owned a pair of shoes. She's been walking around in bare feet.

James: Betty, they just tough it out and they play, but we found out right here in this area that hookworms get in the skin, get in the bloodstream, ultimately into the intestines, and cause very serious disease and sometimes death. We can turn it around by simply giving them shoes.

Sheila: Something as simple as a pair of shoes can really change a child's life. This is a happy place today.

Look at this face! Who wouldn't want to give her a gift for Christmas? So thank you so much! On behalf of her family, those who love her, I think you put the biggest smile on her face that we've seen all day. So thank you for the gift of shoes. Thank you for the gift of life!

In the studio:

Randy: So simple! So simple and so beautiful, Sheila.

Sheila: Just to see the joy on that little one's face -- just amazing!

Randy: We've seen it time and time again. It is so, so simple to make this Christmas so special, so memorable and possibly lifesaving as we pointed out for kids around the world. We've been doing this in China, India; it's a laundry list of countries -- doing it all around the world. Sheila: It's interesting because when you talk about putting shoes on the feet of a child it brings a smile to their face. But one of the things that is really devastating is when a child is born with cleft lip or cleft palate and they can't smile.

There was one child in particular, it was something that I just naturally do when you're in a country and a child has never seen themselves. Sometimes I take a photo on my iPhone and I'll show it to them. I'll be like, "Look!" And usually they're like over the moon. There was one little boy when the camera was turned and he saw himself he was devastated because he didn't know what he looked like. When he saw what he looked like, it was a completely different reaction. He wasn't thrilled, he was horrified. But even the way those children are treated by other people; it is as if you're a monster. There is something really wrong with you.

But we were so moved by compassion and we were able -- he's had his surgery now. He looks so different. And he's so happy. I mentioned earlier that my husband and I already have decided

what we're going to give each other for Christmas and what we're going to do is in Barry's name I'm going to do one surgery, which is \$500 and he is going to do the same for me. Some of you can do that. Honestly, that changes not just the immediate comfort of a child, it changes their destiny. It changes who they see themselves as.

For any gift at all, actually, you know what we're going to do? We're going to send this beautiful little shoe for any gift that you send in.

Randy: And \$1,000 will do two surgeries. So just do whatever the Lord is leading you to do. I just ask that you be involved in some way whether it is \$36 for 10 pairs of shoes, whether it is \$1,000 for some surgeries. A few of you could probably do a whole lot more. I just ask you to pray about it and do what the Lord leads you to do.

I think the important thing is that we do as I referenced earlier, those works, good works that we were created for. God gave us a gift, a gift we can never match at Christmas. You can give a gift. It's hard to put into words just how much it means to these children when they receive something from someone they don't know. It's moving when we consider the fact that God has enabled us to put his arms of love around the world.

So I just ask that you pray about it right now. I know it is early, Christmas is coming. But we have to prepare because we have to get the shoes over there. You can have a huge impact this Christmas. Join with us with Christmas Shoes and Smiles and put a smile on a child's face.

I often think, people get depressed around Christmas because they think it's just all about more, more, more, and more and spending and eating and everything. We can change that. We could actually live as the body of Christ and do what we're on this earth to do.

I want to ask you from the bottom of my heart to please be the person that says, "Yes, I'll bring that smile. I'll give a smile for a lifetime to this little baby boy."

Sheila: You know what I love about this show? It's the impact that children are having on the lives of other children. I think it is a great thing.
