Week 40: Mission: Rescue Life

James & Betty Robison

Rabbi Kirt Schneider #2

Studio discussion:

JAMES: I welcome you to *Life Today*. I'm James Robison. Betty and I are thrilled to have you. We're so glad to have Rabbi Schneider back with us. I just see the joy of the Lord on you. You have a radiance. It's just real. I want you to talk to us about the Torah because you wrote this book, *Decoding the Torah*, the books of the law, since as Christians we're under grace, yet we need to understand that everything God wrote is important; and understanding it and applying it as he wants it applied is important. That's what you're seeking to help us do.

So tell us about the importance of the Torah to the Christian.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Well, the Torah, what I love about the Torah, which is the first five books of our Bible, as most of our listeners and viewers know, it gets into the nitty-gritty of how to live. So what I've done is I've gone through over 100 laws in the Torah, talked about what they meant in their original historical context to Israel. But for us, what do they mean today as disciples of Jesus? So, for example, I'm thinking, we were talking a second ago, one of the laws of the Torah is to not follow an evil majority. And by the way, there are 613 laws in the Torah according to Rabbinic Judaism. So one of the laws is entitled once again to not follow an evil majority.

In the original historical context, it dealt with a judging in a legal setting for the judge not to be influenced by what everybody wanted or by what everybody thought, but rather to judge righteously before the Lord. But today, when we think about applying it to our lives, to not follow an evil majority, I think about how many times believers are tempted and sometimes even yield to compromise biblical values, because our culture is no longer in alignment with those biblical values.

I think, for example, even of the whole LGBTQ agenda and how many Christians really have stepped away from standing on God's Word regarding this issue. And we're not judging people. We're not -- I mean, we're all sinners saved by grace. It's not about that. It's about the fact that in the beginning, God created us, male and female, and we want to affirm that. And we want to affirm that the only way to be fruitful and multiply is by heterosexual relations. But many Christians, because of the pressure from the culture, I mean, I was in the hotel and I was watching a commercial on television, and they were advertising a product, and half of the couples that they had in the commercial were in a homosexual relationship. That's how bad it is. And many Christians, like they backed off of God's Word. Why? Because they yielded to an evil majority.

We need to stand on God's Word, and we need to recognize there's a price to pay. We have to be willing to pay the price to stand with God's Word.

JAMES: I love that, and I don't struggle with that. I struggle with people wanting to bend away from that and redefine it. It's like redefining reality. It's calling black white, and light dark -- dark light. I mean, it's just incredible. Give us some others.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Well, here's another one that kind of applies. It's a command from the book of Exodus, chapter 20, verse 26. And the way the law stated it is the command dealing with how God's priests should dress; the command dealing with how God's priests should dress. Where it comes from, interestingly enough, is when the priest went up to the altar in the temple, first the tabernacle, later the temple, the Lord commanded them not to go up by steps, but to build a ramp up.

Now why would that be? Again, this is why it's good to have a teacher for these kinds of things, because you can miss it. I'm going to read the scripture. It says Exodus 20:28: *You shall not go up by steps to my altar so that your nakedness will not be exposed on it.* So the Lord was actually looking into the situation, and he saw that if the priests would go up by steps, and in those days there were no risers between the steps so you got a big blank space between each

step. So if someone was standing on the other side of the steps or beneath the steps, or off to the right or left, they'd be able to look underneath the steps and see underneath the priest's robe. So the Lord says, Build a ramp so that your nakedness will not be exposed. So what's the point? Modesty. We can dress beautifully as God's people without drawing people to our flesh.

In fact, another one of the laws deals with how God's priests should dress in the positive that they were commanded to dress in garments of beauty and glory. So we, as God's people, should try to dress as attractively as we can. I mean, we all have different means, but to dress beautifully but not to dress seductively. But yet, getting back to the law we just talked about, going along with the evil majority, how many Christians are dressing seductively rather than modestly because they've gone along with the evil majority?

JAMES: You know, I've been married to this girl for over 60 years, isn't that right? And I've never seen her be immodest. She just -- I just love you. I feel like our girls, our children, I think our grandchildren, I can't be around all of them enough, but I know they've been influenced by that. And you can just see the beauty of it. We don't have to try to be sexy, to be beautiful. Sometimes, if you're beautiful, you know you can easily be a sex object, but you don't have to be.

Father, I just want girls to let the beauty that you put in them shine forth. You made them so uniquely beautiful, so special. God, help us to understand just what the rabbi's talking about right now, what you're trying to get us to see. And I pray we'll all be modest; in Jesus' name.

Share something else with us, Rabbi.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: That's beautiful. We need to get back to the basics here. When the Book of Sh'mot, which is the Hebrew word for Exodus, chapter 25, verse eight, the Lord said: "Let them construct a sanctuary for me that I might dwell among them." So God gave Moses a blueprint for the sanctuary, it was the tabernacle in the Hebrew Bible; later became the Temple in Jerusalem. And every single piece of furniture in there was architected by the Lord. The altar

of incense, the Table of showbread. All of it is a divine blueprint that made it possible for the Lord to dwell with his people, Israel.

You know, there was a visible fire above the tabernacle by night and a glory cloud by day, you know, James, Betty, for 40 years. Well, I think, how is this relevant for us today? We're no longer building physical tabernacles that we're meeting with the Lord in. He doesn't dwell in temples made of stone. But what it says to me is that we need to build a sanctuary in our hearts where the spirit of the Lord can rest. I'm thinking, James, Betty, of Yeshua's words, of Jesus's words in John 14, where Jesus said, "If you love me, you'll obey me. And my Father and I," he said, "will come to you, will dwell with you, will come to you, and reveal ourselves to you."

JAMES: We'll make our abode with you. We become a sanctuary of the Lord. He lives in us. He just really can. Even as I've gotten older, I've become more aware of his presence. I think it's because of what I've shared with you in previous programs, even yesterday. I've lost myself in seeing the Father's dream fulfilled. We all have dreams. We all have desires. We all have things that we might want or achieve. But what if you are totally captured by his dream, and your dream becomes fulfilling his dream? You'll find yourself carried by that as an incredible, supernatural, energy-enabling, and giving us divine direction, and how we can see it.

I'm going to tell you, Rabbi, the greatest joy that I've seen in my Father's expressions, as I pray, is the joy that he has, that he has a son here who is totally consumed by his dream, by the desires of his heart to be fulfilled, His kingdom will done on his earth as it is in heaven. And see, I believe that's reality because I believe that's your dream. And I think it carries me. I'm watching this begin to just carry Betty. I think in some ways I've been, maybe a source of inspiration to you, as you have been to me since I met you.

But isn't this exciting, Betty?

BETTY: It really is. And what I hear you saying too, as we're now grandparents and great-grandparents, just as God takes joy in us, his presence in our lives, and our presence in his world, his life, that pleases him. It's just like when our grandchildren, and now our great-

grandchildren, will come around, just to see them smile, just to see them have fun and play, or just to see a picture of -- we've just had another great-grandbaby, the beauty of that. That brings such joy. I think that brings joy to God's heart when he sees us joyful and happy and pleased in his presence.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: It reminds me, Betty, of a dream that a friend of mine had several years ago when she said, "I had this dream, Rabbi. You were playing baseball, and you were hitting home runs. And the Father was taking such joy. But he wasn't taking joy in the fact that you were hitting home runs, He was taking joy in the fact that you were enjoying hitting home runs." That was beautiful. It opened my mind up to a new dimension.

JAMES: Share something else with us. Let me just say this to you. We love you. We're going to pray for you. Tell our viewers, if they wanted to see you in some kind of outreach, where would they go online? Tell us where to go.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: My website: Discovering the Jewish Jesus" -- thank you very much. Discovering The Jewish Jesus.com tells you the place for all our different resources. JAMES: Well, do you have a place that you teach very often in Ohio that people can know about and go and be there?

RABBI SCHNEIDER: We're only doing outreaches overseas right now, so it's all media. It's all the television, radio.

JAMES: You're about to go to Nigeria, so they can follow you over there if they want to be with you in person.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Wow! That would be an interesting meeting!

JAMES: Go ahead and tell us some more. I love listening to you. I love your spirit, his spirit in you.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Thank you, brother. I'm taking off with this area we were just talking about, the Father having joy and seeing us delight in him. I'm thinking about the fact that one of the laws in the Torah in the book of Deuteronomy was where the Lord commanded all of Israel to come to Jerusalem three times a year for the main pilgrim festivals. And what he said they needed to do there was to rejoice before him, to be happy in him, and to present him an offering. And so, as I thought about that, I thought, Why did the Lord just tell them three times a year? And I think about that number three.

So first of all, you think of God. He is the I am. So I am Yahweh. He exists in the three dimensions of time past, present, and future. Then you think of the tabernacle or the temple, three elements: the outer court, the Holy Place, the Holy of Holies. The three patriarchs: Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. And finally, the three manifestations of the Godhead: Father, Son, and Spirit. So three represents wholeness and perfection. So three times a year, the Lord told Israel to come to Jerusalem and be happy in him.

What that says to me, James, Betty, God wants his people to be happy. We know it's hard sometimes, that life is hard, difficulties all around us, but internally God wants us by his grace to rise above it and to rejoice in him and cultivate an attitude of happiness in him.

JAMES: You know when you say the word "happy," the word pops up in my mind joy. I don't know that joy is the more biblical or more spiritual term than happy. Happy seems a little frivolous to me. Joy seems like a resident reality of God, who he is, His joy. The joy of the Lord is our strength. The Lord having joy is our strength. His joy over us gives us strength, no doubt. But he also wants us to have joy in him. He gives us joy, and that joy is the strength to overcome great heaviness.

So I just want to say I live with the spirit of joy. Does that make sense?

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Absolutely. And it is. You're absolutely right. A lot of times, we think about happiness, and it's circumstantially related where the Lord wants us to cultivate that spirit of joy. I'm using the word happiness as a synonym by choosing to focus on the right things. Even if we're going through hard times, we can have joy because we believe that God is causing all things to work together for good to conform us to his image. So absolutely, by focusing on the right things, by focusing on biblical and eternal realities, we can walk through life with joy, with an eternal happiness. Not a happiness that's circumstantial from the world, but a happiness and a contentment that comes from focusing on the light.

JAMES: You know, when I walked in the room back here before we came out, there was just joy all over you. You got up out of the chair, took my hand, and I felt like there's just a joyful presence on you, and I want to thank you for that.

Tell us something else. Give us something that right now –

RABBI SCHNEIDER: You know what's a good one that you'll love because I know you wrote the book on seeing God's glory in animals. So one of the laws in the Torah is to show compassion to animals. What I love about that is when you understand, when I understand that God is really concerned about how I treat animals, it makes me aware that his glory is all around his creation. It's in the chipmunks, it's in the squirrels, it's in the bunnies, it's in the fish. I mean, it just causes you to be more aware of the reality that the whole earth is full of his glory.

JAMES: Go ahead and teach us something else.

RABBI SCHNEIDER: Well, a really practical one is when the Lord commanded the priest to burn sweet incense to him every morning. And what I like about this is the practicality of it, once again. You think about the priest. Every morning in the tabernacle, in the temple, they had to burn the sweet incense. So I'm thinking about the fact, James, Betty, there were probably a lot of mornings that they physically felt tired. There were probably some mornings they didn't get a good night's rest that night. Maybe some mornings they were dealing with health issues,

but you know what? It didn't matter. They did the same thing. They burnt sweet incense to the Lord every morning.

I love this because when I wake up in the morning, I don't ask myself, Do I feel like being in the Word this morning? I don't ask myself, Do I feel like dedicating myself to the Lord today? No. I want to do what the priests did. I begin every day by burning sweet incense to the Lord. I'm in his word. I'm talking to him. I'm being aware of what he's doing in my life. I'm looking to him for the day, for strength for the day. You begin the day by burning sweet incense to the Lord, not because you feel like it. The priests were sometimes tired, sometimes they felt great, but they did it every day regardless of how they felt. And as God's people, we need godly discipline in our lives to really, as you were saying earlier, Betty, we need both the written word and we need the spirit, but we need the discipline of the written word to keep going higher and deeper and becoming stronger.

JAMES: Do you know I'm rejoicing that -- I rejoice when I listen to the word. I rejoice when I'm being corrected by the word. But I'm having a joy now at this point in my life where I'm rejoicing in the fact of how much harmony I have with the word. When I get up in the morning and I wake up, the first thing I do, I'm going to say this will go on for a couple of hours. All I do is thank him and praise him. I could just start praising him for our 30 grandchildren, I see their little faces, and most of them are great-grandchildren now. Eleven are grown and married and giving us all these babies. I just rejoice! I rejoice over the blessings. I thank him, I praise him, and I just can't seem to stop praising him, loving him. To me, that is that joyful incense. That means he's become part of who I am. Let me just say it. It's like he just corrected me. He said, "Say it more clearly. It's part of who I am in you. That's what it is -- part of who I am in you."

Rabbi, thank you. If you'd like to get this book, *Decoding the Torah*, we'll send it to you if you'll help us rescue some children, most of them are children; some are just young people that are being sexually trafficked all over Asia, all over Africa. Would you please? We need to complete a beautiful house, a rescue center in Asia, and we're going to need some big help to do it. I want you to listen to our mission director, John Yeatts, as he just spends so much time on

the mission fields, putting God's arms around people that you enable us to love and help. Just listen to the Father's heart in this father's heart as he's on the mission field. And please reach out and help us put God's arms around the people he gave his son to redeem. Please do that. Watch closely.

Transition roll-in:

JOHN: So I'm standing here in the courtyard of one of our rescue homes here in Southeast Asia, where our team has spent most of the day experiencing what it's like for these girls to live here and to deal with the various house moms and the counselors, and seeing all the programs that go back into healing and restoring a soul. To understand how desperately these safe houses are needed is almost beyond description.

As I was sitting, talking with the country director for this particular mission partner today, and as a dad, I've experienced this for so long. At times you wonder, do other dads feel the same way I do? As I watch this dad who's got two young daughters talking about the trauma that he has had to listen to, and I can see that I'm not alone, that dads feel the same pain that I feel for these girls. And every single one of them have been violated. It sickens me.

But I've been able to come here today, and I've watched the grace of God. Every one of them is getting the gospel. Every one of them has given their hearts to Christ. Mission partner after mission partner, same story. It is the emphasis of everything we do; is that they have the opportunity to share Jesus, because he's the only hope for true healing in the hearts of these children.

So I'm asking you right now, would you please join us so that we can continue to establish safe homes all throughout the world, but specifically here in Southeast Asia?
