**RANDY**: Welcome to Life Today! I'm Randy Robison. Tammy's with me.

TAMMY: Hello!

**RANDY**: You like to head me?

TAMMY: I saw it in the monitor.

RANDY: We like to have fun. There's a lot of people that I've talked to online, and I know you have too. Every once in a while I find somebody that I go, our broadcast audience needs to meet this guest. Well, I found out most of our broadcast audience has seen today's guest, because Kim Crabill is our guest, and she hosts a show called "Coffee with Kim." So many of you know her. You've seen her on different broadcasts interviewing people like this. But today, you're going to get to hear a little bit about her. She has a new book. It is called Always Remember, and we'll tell you how you can get it, because it's a wonderful devotional, daily devotional, and reminder of God's love for us. But would you welcome Kim Crabill to Life Today?

**KIM**: Thank you. Thank you so much for inviting me. This is a true joy to be here.

**RANDY**: How are you doing on that side where you're being interviewed, not doing the interview?

KIM: I don't know. We'll see. I may have a question or two. How about that?

**RANDY**: I know. It's always real awkward. We appreciate you being here. You just met Kim recently.

**TAMMY**: I adore you! We got to share a ride over here from the hotel. And I always cherish those moments, to be honest with you. It gives me a chance to already begin to connect with somebody. But just sitting there sharing that ride, you know, there's a kindred spirit. I

feel like I was already leaning in going, you have so much to say to impart into my life and into their life today. I think it needs to start out with, like, where we always feel like, what gives you the authority to speak into someone's life? What gives you – what have you journeyed that could actually deposit into my life? So I think it starts with taking us back to your life. What have you been through? When did life really begin for you? I think in this book, Always Remember, as I was learning more about you, it takes you back to those early, early years with your grandfather. I wanted to know more about that story. I think people will want to know, too, because it sets the tone for your whole life and what you've journeyed through.

## **Studio Discussion**

**KIM**: Yeah, it really does. One of the things that I think that we can do in life is to really find the power in our stories. So many times, people will look at our lives and they'll think, well, my story doesn't matter. My life is tragic, or it's filled with pain, or loss, or something. And so we're silenced by the fact that we think, well, that doesn't really matter. It does matter!

That's what I love to do. That's my heart and my passion because for so many years, I didn't think my story mattered because it was filled with some tragedy, but everyone's is. Right? But with Always Remember, it actually began because I remember as a counselor, my husband said, "Kim, so many times when I hear you talking to people," when I'm following up with phone calls, he'll say, "You'll end things by saying, 'Always Remember.' Where did that come from?"

I had to think about that, and it took me all the way back to my grandfather. I had my first four years with him, and he knew that I would not be with him forever, so he was immediately speaking God's Word into me. Not happy little mantras, not happy little sayings but he was literally speaking God's word into a four-year-old as he could. Then he would say, "Now always remember."

When we do that, when we speak God's Word into someone, it stays in there because God's Word is alive and active. But that was just very important to me because as I grew up through school and a young mom, those words meant a lot because when I came to a place in life, you see, when we're struggling through life, many times we don't know what to do.

And so we remember them, but we don't know how to act them out. We don't know how to activate God's Word. So in my life, I got to the place to where I wanted to go back and remember all the things he said, but I wanted to live them out. But I wasn't sure how to do that. Which really represents 80% of the women in church today.

But mine came through, a point, Tammy, where I got so tired of not being who God wanted me to be. And so, it threw me into a place of isolation, loneliness, and really trying to reach out and find myself.

**TAMMY:** So can I ask you if we delve a little bit deeper, the four years you're with your grandfather, where were your mom and dad? You've talked about and you've said the things that I picked up on, trauma, abuse. And so I kind of wonder, are you okay sharing that? Like what was that for you that you experienced as a little girl that actually puts you in the arms of your grandfather rather than your parents?

**KIM**: Yeah, absolutely. Well, my mom chose to have me at the age of 16, which she could have chosen something else. Making the right choices does not mean that life is always going to be easy. Many times, even for those for whom you've made the right choice for.

In my story, I didn't understand why I had to leave at the age of four. I didn't understand all the trauma. We went from one environment to another. So I think that's what caused the – I wasn't emotionally available to myself. There were so many things that the little girl had to pack up. This is the story of so many people in our churches today or in life today.

But what I did was I grew up trying to become who everyone needed me to be, who I so desperately wanted to be. So I began to pack the hurt and the pain, the shame and the guilt of different parts of my life into this heart. It just kept suppressing until one day, you all — but I had a heart for God.

I had accepted him at the young age of nine, so I knew the Lord. I just didn't know what to do with him. And I didn't know if he loved me. I had heard he did. But Tammy, I was checking all the boxes. Randy, I was doing everything that I thought I was supposed to be doing, but I didn't feel a connection.

I remember one event after I had – I was a women's ministry director of a large megachurch in the South, and I remember we had finished this great, great event. I watched everyone leaving, and they were so happy, and they were so overjoyed. I was thinking, why can't I feel that? I want to feel that!

Well, I went on to the grocery store to pick up some things, and a lady walked over to me and she stopped, Tammy. She did something that's so important in our world today. She stopped. She looked at me. She touched me. She said, "How are you doing really?" She stopped for an answer, Randy.

So I didn't know. I felt at that moment that I had been exposed. I thought, oh my gosh, this woman can see me, the real me. She's hearing the words of condemnation I'm walking around with in my mind. I did not know what to do.

So I parked my buggy and I said, "I am so great! Praise the Lord, everything is good." And I started scooting out of there. As I was going from that moment to my parked vehicle outside, I felt like I was walking, running through the years of my life, being stripped away of all these Christian cliches that we carry that we feel like that we must live up to until I got into my car.

When I got in my car, Randy, I allowed myself to do something that I had not done since I was four years old. I allowed myself to cry. And I began crying because Tammy, I'd always felt like if I ever stop crying, I may not – if I ever start, I may not stop.

So I just began to cry. Then I did what we always do. I started shaking it off, going, I'm okay. Be a big girl! I was told as a little girl to be a big girl. Be a big girl!

And as I was shaking it and trying to be okay, the most amazing thing happened in my life. It was the pivotal point in my life that I want every listener to hear today. Because in my need to be okay, in my desire to be okay, in my heart, to be everything that God wanted me to be, I heard the most profound voice, and I know it to be the voice of the Lord.

As I was saying, I'm okay, I'm okay, from that darkness, from my tears I heard, Kim, you are not okay. But you can be. But you can be.

And that's the message today. We have so much hurt. We have so much pain. We have so many people sitting in the pews of our church, and they are good people with good hearts. They have so much to say, but they're being silenced by shame, guilt, and regret from their past.

Jesus is saying, I know where you are. People say to me so often, why was that such a good, pivotal moment? I said, Because for the first time in my life I felt like God was there. He saw me as I was, in my pain, in my hurt, and he wasn't disgusted by it, Tammy.

He was going, Matthew 11:28, "Come to me, you're weary and your burdened, and I will give you rest." That's my first book, Burdens to Blessings.

When Jesus said, "Come to me, you're weary and your burdened, and I will give you rest." Rest there in the Greek means reversal. Burden in the Greek means a task, and waiting.

And to me that means bring me – See, the reason I wasn't making the connection is because I was trying to bring all the good things. Oh, look I can organize. Oh, look I can do this great event. All along Jesus was saying bring me the burden. Bring me the hurt.

**TAMMY:** What was the burden? What was the hurt for you? I think if I'm understanding your story a little bit, too, I mean, everything you went through with your parents, your grandfather, it would be having to move away from your grandfather now, that covering, that love, that consistency as a little girl, that all the trauma, the triggers, the stuff, and even being told, am I correct, that you were a mistake? So how do you carry that in your whole life? Did it come down to that moment in the car like I'm not okay?

**KIM**: Oh, it was the most unbelievable moment that I want every woman – this is why I travel the nation teaching this. Because I want every woman and man to know this freedom. That Christ said when he died, he has left us free. The truth will set us free. Says live as free people.

I was living under this horrid oppression of my life thinking it didn't matter. But when I heard through that door, "Oh, my gosh! If it weren't for this mistake, we wouldn't be in this mess," I went from being my grandfather's princess majestic to a mistake in that moment.

From that moment on I thought, oh, no one will ever think I'm a mistake. And not that I was treated that way, but I thought that. You see, it's what we think about ourselves.

We have to get to the point to where we believe in Jesus, but then we have to take that big leap to believe him, believe who we are in Christ, pick up that identity again, understand that he comes to rescue, restore us, and to make us his royal priesthood.

And to really be able to say, okay, this is not what I expected. This is not the life I planned. But this is the life that God entrusted me with.

I can take it, and I can start to have the mindset of Christ and be able to quit fighting my past and turn and start fighting for my future. Because if we're fighting for our past, it's a battle we can never win. We can't change it.

But if we take that and start fighting for our future, it's literally a battle we cannot lose because we are more than conquerors in Christ.

So why not take what we have lived and allow God to, and allow one another? Because remember, my story began with another woman who said to me, "How are you doing?"

We have to see one another. We have to make connection with one another. We have to stop in the midst of this crazy world and really be able to see one another.

**TAMMY**: So what if somebody finds themselves, Kim, later today at the grocery store. Nobody sees them. They make their way out to the car. They're sitting in the car just gripping the steering wheel, and they're saying, I'm not okay. I don't feel okay. But they hear the voice of God that says, But you can be. What does that next step then look like for them when they feel like, but okay, I can be okay, but how do I get there? What's a practical step for them that they could take today to move into freedom in their life?

**KIM**: Such a great, great question. The first thing I did was I opened my Bible. First thing is I prayed. Then I made that commitment. God, if I can be okay, I will. Tell me what to do.

I believe the next thing you do is find someone to talk to. People go, I don't know what to say. It may not look right. People are not looking for perfection, they're looking for connection.

If you call someone and say, I need someone to talk to, we think we're bothering other people, but that's the greatest honor that we can give to someone, to be ourselves, to be our most authentic self. That's really how I began.

I invited seven women into my home, and I said, "I need you to not only see the things that you have been seeing in me, maybe the good things that you might see. I need you to see all of me."

So I began sharing my story. When you begin to share your story, those things of shame, guilt, and regret began to fall off. All those things.

All of a sudden, the things that you were trying to hide for so many years, you begin to understand, that is your personal ministry.

You all have stories after stories after stories of people who really caught the glimpse of who they are in Christ, and how their stories really have the power to help others.

**RANDY**: Absolutely. By the way, if you're watching right now and you're like, I don't have anybody to talk to, but you want to talk to someone, there's someone who will pray with you right now. Just pick up the phone. Yes, it's a stranger, but it's another person who loves Jesus and who wants to pray with you, who wants to hear you, who will listen to you and lift up your concern to the Lord. So take advantage of that. Kim, I so appreciate the message. I have a question for you. I'm of the age where I'm getting lots of things in the mail for retirement, related to retirement.

**TAMMY**: Congratulations!

**RANDY**: I know! I finally reached it. But you're talking about a purpose. You're talking about coming to healing. If you haven't, you know, or at least getting on the path to healing, do you ever retire from this?

**KIM**: No, no, no, no! I would never even think – I love this! This is what – when you see another person and when I'm speaking, I can literally look across the audience and I can see where God is freeing people. I can see the hope being restored. No, I would never. I'm telling you, I will probably – they'll have to tell me when I get to heaven I have to stop.

**RANDY**: I think that's true for all of us. Because I know the older we get, the more we feel like maybe, let the younger kids take over, but what I hear you saying is, hey, wherever God has you, wherever you're ministering right in front of you, you never quit. You always have something to offer.

**KIM**: Well, exactly. You think about what we have to offer. The most genuine thing we have to offer is ourselves and our story. When we share our story we're glorifying God, and we're encouraging others. To heal, we need one thing, and that's to be able to speak. I need to be able to speak my heart and I need someone to receive it. So we're all, we all have such a powerful ministry and mission. And for those people who are sitting in church thinking that, oh, I don't have anything to offer, you have yourself to offer. You have your story of what God has given to you, and every bit of it matters. Revelations 12:11, "By the blood of the Lamb and by the telling of your story, this will overcome." It's a powerful, powerful promise.

**TAMMY:** I love what you've offered us. This devotion is so good. You've got like over 40 different contributors, which I love. At the end result for this, what was your hope? I use the word hope because I always feel like when we're writing, even as authors, my goal is always to bring life and to bring hope and to bring purpose and to bring truth. What was your goal when you wrote the devotion?

**KIM**: To speak into the next generation. Psalms 145:4 says that we are to command his ways and his mighty works into the next generation. That's what my grandfather did to me. He spoke into me his words because he spoke the word of God, live beyond his life. He's still with me because he gave that to me. That's something that we can do every day, and we should be doing every day. It would behoove us as believers to speak what God is doing, the purity of His Word, the purity of his promises into other people so the value of who he has been to us is not even a question to those who come behind us.

**TAMMY**: Yeah, it's such a good word. It's such a great devotion, Randy. I think we should get this in the hands of as many people that want it today.

**RANDY**: I would love it. I would love for you to support our outreach and get Always Remember. Request it whenever. And this is wonderful. Obviously, this will help feed you spiritually every day for the next year. But Tammy, there are those that need food today.

# **Cause Spot**

The heartache Paulina experiences watching her children go without food pales in comparison to her sorrow she still carries over the death of her youngest child.

Paulina went on to share from her broken heart that she fears without help this same type of tragedy could take the lives of her remaining children, Jose and Mateo.

**TAMMY**: When I think of Paulina's story, I think of a mother's plea that we just can't turn away from. She's lost three children to hunger. As she weeps, she's just simply asking please, please remember. Please don't forget us. It's such a simple cry of her heart, and yet it's so deep. It runs so deep. When I hear her say that, I think to myself, I cannot forget. I cannot sit here and forget. I'm praying that you have felt the same today as you watched

that. Like, what can I do? I don't want to forget these people that are so desperate for something so simple that I have access to every single day.

So what can I do? What can you do? We can't just sit back and hope that the next person will catch the vision. I'm praying that you catch the vision with us today, and that you will step in and help bring life to Paulina and the rest of her children, and so many other children around the world right now that need it desperately. It's so simple! We, right now, are feeding over 350,000 people every day. It's incredible. I love when I get to tell a complete stranger what we get to do. But there are so many more that are dying right now because they don't have the program that we are longing to offer them. We need the funds to do it. So how can you be a part of that today?
